History of S.C. Mining Act

1976

 S.C. Mining Act Established (Chapter 19)

2004

 Any subsequent fee increases must be retained by DHEC for mining program

1990

 Chapter 19 rescinded and Click to add replaced by Chapter 20

JXc

• Allows appeals to ALC

1993

 Mining program leaves SC Land Resources Commission for DHEC

2016

• **Exemption** for mining permit for Ports Authority works

1997

General Permit established

2018

 Exemption for mining permit for Public Railways



History of S.C. Mining Regulations

• Amendment to R.89-340 (Fee Schedule) - 2003

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• Permit Application Fee: $500 --> $600
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• Substantial Modification Fee: \$250 --> \$600

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• Transfer Fee: $100 --> $600
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• Certificate of Exploration: \$125 --> \$300

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Annual Operating Fee: $125 --> $375
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
Late fees remain the same (\$50/mo)





Regulatory Process



Notice of Drafting

- Published in State Register, August 26, 2022
- Comment period ended September 26, 2022 with no comments received

Stakeholder Engagement

Notice of Proposed Regulation

- Publish in State Register specifying new regulatory text and/or changes
- Sets public hearing and additional 30-day comment period

Notice of Final Regulation

- Submitted to the Board for final determination
- Public Hearing

Legislative Review

• Submit within one year of NOD



Notice of Drafting Components

Propose amending R.89-10 through 89-350

- to more efficiently regulate mining activities that protect human and environmental health
- Propose revising setbacks
- Consider revisions for
 - blasting,
 - permitting,
 - bonding,
 - noticing,
 - operational requirements and
 - other administrative changes
